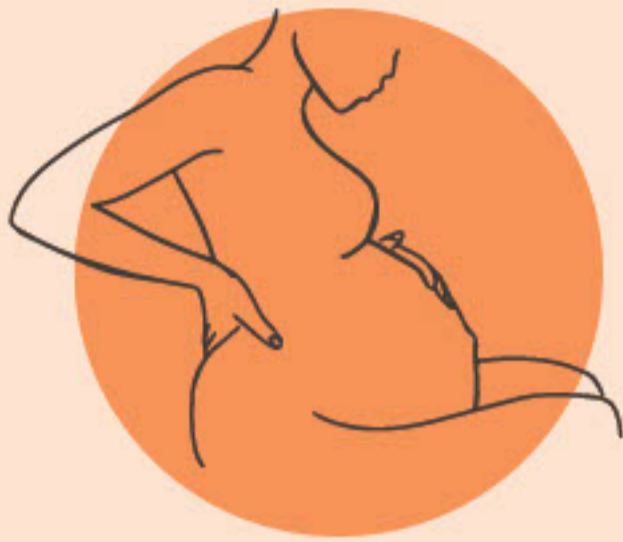

1,284 babies born

1 in 21 infants in Haiti do not make it to their first birthday.

1 in 208 women die of pregnancy related complications, in childbirth, or within the immediate postpartum period.

59% of Haitians live on less than \$2.44 a day.

Where there is extreme poverty, mothers sometimes have to choose between food for their family or having a skilled attendant at their birth.

This is why **FREE** care matters.

Our Birth Centers welcome women and babies every day and make it so they no longer have to make this choice.

No mother or child should ever die, simply because of where they live.

“For midwives to achieve their life-saving and life-changing potential, greater investment is needed in their education and training, midwife-led delivery, and midwifery leadership.”

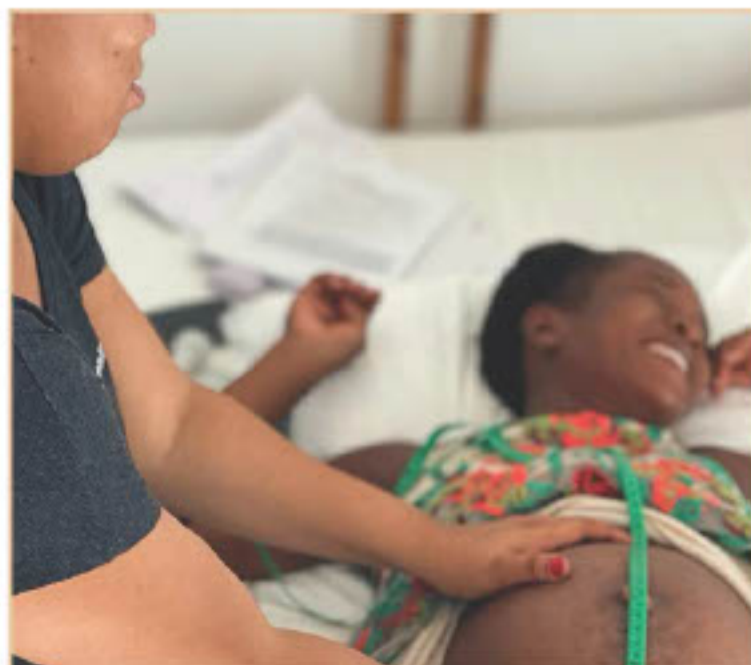

This is especially true in Haiti where the infant and maternal mortality rates are the **highest** in the western hemisphere.

We had six students excel in our program this year and they will graduate in spring 2024.

Our new Cap Haitien Birth Center is equipped with a classroom and skills lab where our students will learn hands on experience that will raise them up to be compassionate and skilled midwives.

- The world faces a shortage of 900,000 midwives.
- Fully investing in midwives by 2035 would save 4.3 million lives per year.
- As well as attending births, midwives provide a range of antenatal and postnatal care.

Detaining women & their babies

According to the World Health Organization, there are an uncounted number of humans being detained in private and public hospitals around the globe for their inability to pay their bills.

Unfortunately this is very common in some hospitals in Haiti. Women and their babies are being forced to live and sleep in horrific conditions until their bill is paid.

We are committed to facilitating the release of these women and babies whenever we get word they are being detained.

We are working to end this practice in Haiti.

human rights violation





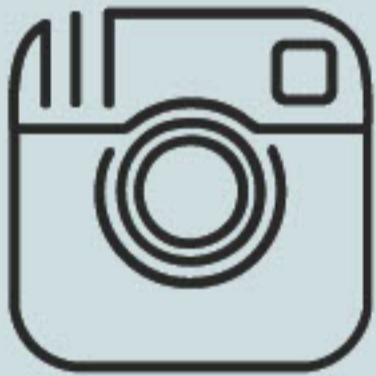
